

## **Nicotine Dependence Service Undergraduate Summer Student Program**

The Nicotine Dependence Service (NDS) Summer Student Program is designed to introduce undergraduate students to research, knowledge translation, evaluations, and clinical environments. The program will give students a hands-on experience that helps them take the next step in their education and career.

### **WHAT TO EXPECT**

We look forward to onboarding new students each year and offer an enriching and fast-paced environment that is unique in offering exposure to clinical, knowledge translation, research and education-related activities in one integrated service, the Nicotine Dependence Service. A placement at the Nicotine Dependence Service provides exposure to a professional environment and interdisciplinary team that can provide valuable experience and help inform a future career path by meeting and/or shadowing different team members as relevant. This studentship will take place at our primary site at 175 College St.

Students will be assigned a mentor who will provide close supervision of the project (details below). Students will also have access to consultations and interviews with clinical, knowledge translation or other scientific staff as applicable. Students are expected to follow a workplan with detailed tasks to complete a project, and prepare and deliver a presentation for the NDS group during the last week of their placement. Students may be involved in preparing abstracts or other documents to enhance the breadth of their experience.

### **STIPEND**

We will place students in approved projects for a minimum of 12 weeks up to a maximum of 16 weeks. Students will receive stipends commensurate with the length of the placement, ranging from approximately \$6,300 for a 12-week placement, up to \$8,400 for a 16-week placement. These stipend amounts are based on a 37.5 hour work week. Students will be paid monthly.

### **SUMMER PROJECTS**

There is one project posting available for 2019, with details outlined below. The student will work on one primary project but other assignments may also be required. There may be an opportunity to engage in different projects as well, but the primary assignment must be completed.

### **STUDENT SUPERVISION**

You will work with a research supervisor who will functionally supervise your activities and provide guidance along the way. The supervising coordinator will possess expertise around the topic area of your primary assignment. You can expect regular meetings with them to discuss and review progress, help answer questions and to provide a positive and encouraging learning and working environment. Together, you will establish a realistic workplan for your project and identify project milestones and

check-in points. You will additionally meet with Scientist(s) who lead the projects you are assigned to and the Principal Investigator of Nicotine Dependence Service activities, Dr. Peter Selby.

### **APPLICATION PROCESS:**

Students are welcome to submit applications starting on Friday, January 25, 2019 and the applications will close on **Friday February 8, 2019**. Applications will be reviewed by February 15, 2019; only students accepted for the interview process will be contacted within the week of February 18<sup>th</sup> – 22<sup>nd</sup>, 2019. ### **STUDENT ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA**

To be eligible to apply, the student must:

- Be enrolled in a full-time undergraduate program (medical students are eligible to apply); be currently in school, and returning to school in the year following the summer studentship placement;
- Have never been a previous student of the Nicotine Dependence Service;
- Have an interest in one of the following areas: knowledge translation, education-related activities or research in the tobacco field;
- Each project specifies additional eligibility criteria and/or minimum competencies required.

## 1 Nicotine Dependence Service - Knowledge Translation Project

The Knowledge Translation summer student will be involved in some of the team's core projects including:

- My Change Plan mobile app: A smart phone application to help smokers quit smoking
- Pregnets: A web-based tool to support pregnant and postpartum women looking for smoking cessation support
- Evaluating the Nicotine Dependence Clinic: A clinic that helps 1,000 smokers in their quit journey
- PACE: An initiative to help smokers who have multiple risk behaviours.
- GRAND: An initiative to facilitate dentists to address tobacco use

Specific responsibilities include: organizing and supporting focus group discussions and/or interviews to evaluate mobile app usability and/or Nicotine Dependence Clinic performance; conducting literature reviews; developing materials for project webinars and conference presentations; gathering social media content to promote Pregnets; and recruiting participants for multiple studies, among others.

### **Student Eligibility Criteria:**

- Strong interpersonal skills
- Superior organization skills and attention to detail
- Effective time management and communication (oral and written)
- Microsoft Office proficiency is required
- Candidate must feel comfortable working with clients of the Nicotine Dependence Clinic
- Experience with academic writing, and scientific literature reviews would be considered an asset
